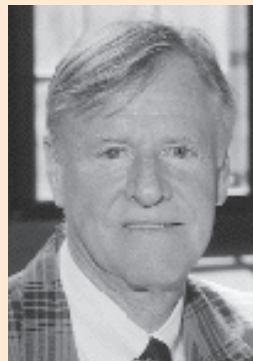

## The Alumni Council Awards for Service to Princeton

### April A. Chou '96

April Chou, chair of the Asian American Alumni Association (known as A4P,) devoted countless hours with other volunteer leaders in organizing Kaleidoscope, the Alumni Conference on Race and Community at Princeton University. She impressed many with her commitment to process and consensus-building that helped to create an extraordinary event.

A4P has achieved much under April's leadership: creating a new Web site and TigerNet discussion group; hosting events across the country; and offering an annual Reunions panel and reception.

From the minute she arrived as a student, April began to serve the University. By the time she graduated, she had been a member of the Race Relations Working Group and the Task Force on Diversity in the Curriculum, among many other things.

April has been serving as an alumna volunteer since graduation. She also joined her local Alumni Schools Committee and was a class section chair for Annual Giving.

### John R. Emery '52

The Class of '52 has become a model of a cohesive and enthusiastic class—and many claim that the reason is John Emery.

Just how does he do it? With teamwork and leadership.

John displayed his skill at **teamwork** even as a student at Princeton. He lettered in three varsity sports: football, basketball, and baseball.

Later he led his class for the five years leading up to '52's 25th reunion. And, from 1982, was a leader as class agent for thirteen years, achieving reunions records for their 35th and 40th. In the 11 years that John ran off-year campaigns, he collected the Class of 1939 Award 10 times for raising the most dollars.

His **leadership** has touched many beyond the Class of '52. John joined the Development Office for the 250th anniversary campaign. There he is fondly remembered for his mentoring of junior staff members—a gift which will bear long-term results for Princeton.

### Robert B. Hollander '55

Bob Hollander has been a loyal alumnus, receiving the Class of '55 Award for Distinguished Achievement, serving on the Alumni Council's Executive Committee, and marshalling for the P-Rade. His renown, however, comes from his teaching role in the classroom and beyond.

In fact, praise arrives from across the country, from Princetonians spanning five decades, from the Class of '53 to the Class of '03:

Bob's "Reunions Dante Seminar is the affirmation that intellectual life not only continues after graduation, but also forges ties among alumni of wide-ranging interests, disciplines, and classes."

"It would be no understatement to say that Bob's commitment to binding us...into a lifetime community of learning has been a foundation stone in much of our own feelings toward and commitment to Princeton."

Finally, "Bob Hollander has unfailingly been a brilliant scholar, but he's also been tireless in his devotion to Princeton, its students, and its alumni."

### William K. Selden '34

In the 1980's Bill Selden was asked to write a history of the Woodrow Wilson School's early years. Since that first book, Bill has been averaging about one a year. His topics have ranged from Isabelle McCosh to Princeton's chapels; from the role of women at Princeton to Reunions. He has written the histories of Alexander Hall, Nassau Hall, and Maclean House.

Along the way he has developed a devoted following. One fan marvels at his patient and kind approach even as he delivers manuscripts with "lightning speed." Another admires Bill's dogged research, always going to the sources behind the sources.

Bill's affection and his work for Princeton go well beyond his booklets. He has always said "yes," whether it is to serve on a committee, volunteer for a capital campaign or marshal at the P-rade.

Bill's historical writings and life have given voice to the many facets of the Princeton community.
