In 1997, the Class of 1942 established the following award for dues excellence:

The 1942 Senior Dues Participation Award is presented annually to that class, more than 50 years out of Princeton, whose class roll as of the start of the fiscal year (July 1) is 100 or more and which by May 1 has attained the highest percentage of dues payers.

The award is presented at the Alumni Council Luncheon on the Friday of Reunions and consists of:

- a banner suitably reflecting the class' achievement to be carried in the P-rade, and
- a framed plaque showing the numerals of the winning class and the percentage achieved.

To be eligible for the award, the class treasurer must forward the total number of dues payers to the Alumni Council by **May 1**. Please keep a computer run or similar ledger of dues collected (both number of collections and the amount of each dues payment) as it may be requested as back-up. Life membership or payment of dues for life will count toward dues participation, but only full dues payments made by the classmate to whom they are attributed will count.
