Thomas Conlan


Thomas Conlan is Professor of East Asian Studies and History, and Director of the Program in East Asian Studies at Princeton University. His research explores how processes such as warfare, or ritual performance, determined the politics, ideals, and social matrix of Japan from the tenth through the sixteenth centuries. A prolific writer, Conlan is the author of five books and numerous articles about the political, social, and intellectual transformations of Japan. On this journey, Professor Conlan's lectures will focus on Japanese history and his most recent publication, "*Samurai and the Warrior Culture of Japan, 471-1877: A Sourcebook.*"

Jim Laurie

A distinguished international broadcaster, writer, and media consultant who has witnessed defining moments in Asia's history for more than 50 years, Jim Laurie first visited Japan as a young writer/reporter in 1970 before embarking as a war correspondent in Indochina. He served as ABC News bureau chief in Tokyo in the late 1980s. Laurie's Emmy Award winning documentary film, *Myths Behind the Miracle*, examined Japan's economic success in the late 20th century and some of the social reasons that it could not be sustained.


PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



Tradition, Ceremony, and Ritual



A mysterious island nation, one of unsurpassed natural beauty and way of life, Japan and its fascinating culture are laden with ancient spiritual rituals, symbolism, and rich, storied tradition. Tea ceremonies, *Noh* drama, *ikebana* (flower arrangement, also known as *kado* or “the way of the flowers”), *matsuri* (the many seasonal festivals of worship), and classical landscape gardens are just some of the long-held traditions. Look for these different types of gardens: the paradise garden, *kare-sansui* (dry landscape) garden, strolling garden, and tea garden—each with a different symbolic interpretation. Silent contemplation will reveal the lessons of the *kare-sansui* rock garden at Ryoan-ji, Kyoto’s Temple of the Peaceful Dragon, founded in 1450. This garden, one of the most famous in the world, represents the ultimate expression of Zen Buddhism. Legend says that only 14 of the 15 rocks in the garden can be seen at once, and only when one attains spiritual enlightenment does the final stone reveal itself.





DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

Home City/ Osaka, Japan/Kyoto

Day 1 and Day 2

Depart the U.S. and cross the International Date Line. Arrive in Osaka, then transfer to impeccably preserved Kyoto. Check into the KYOTO HOTEL OKURA and enjoy an evening at leisure.

Kyoto

Day 3

Visit the UNESCO World Heritage site of Kinkaku-ji Temple, the vaunted “Golden Pavilion.” Continue on to Ryoan-ji Temple, constructed as an aristocrat’s villa during the Heian Period (794 to 1185).

Enjoy the afternoon at leisure and a welcome reception this evening. (B,R)

Kyoto

Day 4

Visit the UNESCO World Heritage-designated monument of *Kiyomizu-dera* (“Pure Water Temple”), where the main hall and veranda were built without a single nail. Experience the serenity of the temple’s monumental *hondo* (main hall) and visit Otowa Falls, where a sip of the “pure water” is reputed to bestow health, success or beauty.

This afternoon, learn more about shogun history at the UNESCO-designated Nijo Castle, built for shogun Tokugawa Ieyasu. (B)

Kyoto/Himeji

Day 5

Enjoy a guided visit of the grounds surrounding UNESCO World Heritage-designated Himeji Castle, Japan’s most stunning and best-preserved feudal fortress. Embark the ship this afternoon. (B,L,D)

Hagi

Day 7

Tour Hagi’s 17th-century Toko-ji Temple on Kikuyake and walk past dwellings that once housed samurai in the city’s old castle town. Visit the Kikuyake House—one of the best-preserved examples of merchant-style architecture

Hiroshima/Miyajima

Day 6

Drive to the solemn Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park in central Hiroshima—which marks the spot where on August 6, 1945, the first atomic bomb used in war left only structural remnants of Hiroshima’s Genbaku Dome—and visit the Peace Memorial Museum.

Call at the island of *Miyajima* (“Shrine Island”) to tour the sixth-century Itsukushima Shrine. The shrine’s impressive Great Torii Gate—one of the largest in Japan—appears to float on water during high tide. Attend a Captain’s Welcome Reception on board the ship. (B,L,R,D)

from the Edo period (1603 to 1868)—and explore the Hagi Uragami Museum. (B,L,D)

Sakaiminato for Matsue

Day 8

Tour the Adachi Museum of Art, where 20th-century and modern Japanese art coalesce with six perfectly landscaped gardens as “living paintings,” and see 17th-century Matsue Castle. Enjoy onboard lectures this afternoon while cruising the Sea of Japan. (B,L,D)

Ulsan, South Korea, for Gyeongju

Day 9

Travel from Ulsan in rural South Korea to the cradle of



the Silla Kingdom (57 B.C. to A.D. 935) in historical Gyeongju. Visit the stunning eighth-century Bulguksa Temple and learn about Silla history in the Gyeongju National Museum, which houses more than 30,000 artifacts, before touring the Royal Burial Mounds at Tumuli Park. (B,L,D)

Moji, Japan

Day 10

Visit the striking 12th-century Akama Shrine, dedicated to

the child emperor Antoku. Enjoy a Captain's Farewell Reception on board the ship this evening. (B,L,R,D)

Uno for Kurashiki/Okayama (Koraku-en Garden)

Day 11

Travel to the Kurashiki Bikan District to visit the old merchant quarter and see the traditional black-tiled houses—painted white and situated along a canal framed with weeping willows.

This afternoon, walk through the beautiful Koraku-en in Okayama. This strolling garden is unique for its large, grassy areas and distinctive wooden Ryuten, a pavilion with a stream running through it. (B,L,D)

Day 12

After breakfast, disembark and continue on the Osaka and Nara Post-Program Option or transfer to the airport for your return flight home. (B)


