



Afro-Cuban Arts & Culture in Havana In Support of the Cuban People

Visiting Cuba can be a transformative and moving experience. We invite you to join your fellow Princetonians in Havana for an inspiring look at contemporary life that few visitors have the opportunity to witness, with a special focus on Afro-Cuban arts and culture.

On this people-to-people tour, connect with a diverse range of local personalities, including an architectural historian, social psychologist, dancers, artists, and a Santería high priest. Go behind the scenes at gallery tours, enjoy private receptions, and venture into the homes of local people. You will discover a land of fascinating contradictions: vintage automobiles fill the streets as if the 1950s never ended, yet the country stands on the cusp of significant change. An emerging private sector now provides Cubans with opportunities that were once unimaginable.

Alongside Princeton study leader **Reena Goldthree**, assistant professor of African American studies, delve into Cuba's rich Afro-Cuban heritage. Learn about Santería, Palo Monte, and other Afro-Cuban religions in Regla and Guanabacoa; discover the colorful murals, music, and dance of Callejón de Hamel, a center of Afro-Cuban art and cultural heritage; and journey to the captivating seaside city of Matanzas, renowned as a birthplace of *rumba* and numerous Afro-Cuban folkloric traditions.



Afro-Cuban Arts & Culture in Havana In Support of the Cuban People

December 28, 2025 - January 3, 2026



SUNDAY, DECEMBER 28: DEPARTURE / HAVANA, CUBA

Welcome to Havana! Upon your independent arrival at José Martí International Airport, you will be greeted and transferred to **Paseo 206**, your boutique hotel in a quiet, residential neighborhood. Gather this evening for a festive welcome dinner at a *paladar*, a privately-owned restaurant usually located in the proprietor's home and largely staffed by family members.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 29: HAVANA / REGLA / GUANABACOA / HAVANA

Founded in 1519, Havana remains the Caribbean's most impressive historical urban center. Participate in a morning lecture and discussion with a local architectural historian, then depart on a walking tour of UNESCO-listed **Old Havana**, including four of its expansive plazas and the 18th-century **Havana Cathedral (Catedral de San Cristóbal)**, one of the oldest cathedrals in the Americas.

Following lunch, learn more about Santería, Palo Monte, and other Afro-Cuban religions in **Regla** and **Guanabacoa**, two municipalities near Havana. Step inside the **Iglesia de Nuestra Señora de Regla** and stand before the revered **Black Madonna (La Santísima Virgen de Regla)**, a powerful symbol of the community's spiritual life.

At the **Museo Municipal de Guanabacoa**, examine important artifacts related to Afro-Cuban religions, including those of the *Orisha Elegguá*, a deity who presides over crossroads and transitions.

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 30: HAVANA

This morning, explore the **National Museum of Fine Arts of Havana**, Cuba's largest museum. An independent curator will lead you on a private tour of its vast collections of works by leading Cuban artists, with a special focus on Afro-Cuban art.

After lunch, discover the colorful murals of **Callejón de Hamel**, a center of Afro-Cuban art and culture in Havana. Enjoy a performance of live music and dance and see numerous shrines to *Orishas*, spirits from the Santería tradition.


Later, visit the house of a **Babalawo** (Santería high priest) for an inside look at the rituals and practices of Santería that have been passed down through generations. Dinner and the rest of the evening are free to enjoy at your leisure.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 31: HAVANA / JAIMANITAS / HAVANA

Attend a morning lecture given by the distinguished **Norma Guillard**, a Cuban social psychologist and adjunct lecturer at the University of Havana. Following lunch, venture just outside Havana to the picturesque fishing village of **Jaimanitas**. Visit the house and studio of artist José Rodríguez Fuster, whose public artwork has been compared to that of Gaudí in Barcelona.

Take a walking tour of the village to see how Fuster has ingeniously decorated more than 80 surrounding homes with ornate murals and domes, tailored to the personalities of his neighbors. You will also behold his masterpiece, *The Artists' Wall*, a breathtaking quilt of dozens of tiles, each one signed and donated by other Cuban artists.





Afterwards, return to Havana and join a local expert at the **Colón Cemetery**, often referred to as Cuba's largest sculpture park. Admire the ornate tombstones commemorating Cuban heroes, statesmen, and novelists, each one a testament to Cuba's cultural heritage.

As evening falls, make your way to the **Ludwig Foundation of Cuba**, one of Cuba's few NGOs, for a presentation on Cuban art, with several local artists in attendance. Later this evening, toast to 2026 at a **special New Year's Eve celebration**.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 1: HAVANA / MATANZAS / HAVANA

Journey to the captivating seaside city of **Matanzas**, renowned as a birthplace of *rumba* and numerous Afro-Cuban folkloric traditions. Matanzas is also known as the "Venice of Cuba" for the 17 bridges and three rivers that traverse its environs. En route to the city, pause at the **Bacunayagua Bridge**, the highest in all of Cuba, and revel in the panoramic views of the verdant valley below.

Upon arrival in Matanzas, visit the **Castillo de San Severino**, an 18th-century castle built by African enslaved people, and a poignant symbol of the city's past. The castle houses objects and photos that offer powerful insights into the reality of enslaved life. Next, visit **Ediciones Vigía**, an artisanal publishing house where skilled craftspeople create handmade books, and meet an artist in his studio.

After lunch, ascend the Monserrate hills to **La Ermita de Monserrate**, a small late 19th-century neoclassical church,
where you will witness a special performance by the Choir of
Matanzas. Return to Havana for an evening at leisure.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 2: HAVANA / SAN FRANCISCO DE PAULA / HAVANA

This morning, you may opt to proceed to Cuba's leading art school, the **Instituto Superior de Arte (ISA)**, and delight in an opportunity to interact with professors and students and view their artwork.

Alternatively, venture outside the bustling city to the small, hilltop village of **San Francisco de Paula** for a visit to **Finca Vigía (Lookout Farm)**, the house where Ernest Hemingway lived for 20 years. View the rooms through open windows from the surrounding terraces; see Hemingway's famous fishing boat *Pilar*; and climb the tower to his study.

Later, you will have exclusive access to an informal rehearsal of the **Rosario Cárdenas Dance Company**, led by the acclaimed choreographer/director. Afterwards, you will have an opportunity to chat with the performers.

Before the day's end, enjoy a private visit to **Fábrica de Arte Cubano** (FAC), the city's liveliest multidisciplinary performing and visual arts space, named one of "the world's greatest places" by *Time* magazine.
