

Annual Giving provides vital start-up funds to launch the Bridge Year Program, establishing tuition-free, global service-learning opportunities for incoming first-year students. Endowed in 2019, the Novogratz Bridge Year Program has supported more than 370 Princeton undergraduates in nine-month programs based in countries such as Bolivia, Cambodia, Costa Rica, India, Indonesia and Senegal.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Annual Giving funds support students and aid faculty efforts to reimagine how classes are taught virtually. Annual Giving support also helps launch a comprehensive testing program that allows the University to resume its mission of in-person residential teaching and learning.

Chemist David MacMillan joins the Princeton faculty. Annual Giving funds enable Princeton to go the extra mile to recruit world-class scholars and teachers. In 2021, MacMillan is awarded the Nobel Prize in chemistry for developing asymmetric organocatalysis, an environmentally friendlier and inexpensive method to build molecules.

In an effort to recruit world-class molecular biologists, the University utilizes Annual Giving funds to purchase a cryo-electron microscopy (cryo-EM) machine that produces high-resolution, three-dimensional images of biological molecules. The strategic gamble pays off, as multiple cryo-EM experts join the faculty in molecular biology, engineering and applied sciences.

McCosh 50, the iconic lecture hall that opened in 1907, is renovated with 21st-century technology while preserving its historic character. This remarkable campus enhancement is made possible by support from generations of alumni, parents and friends through Annual Giving.
