SUMMARY

If you are interested in restarting or expanding your Regional Association (RA), CORA is here to help! We can pair you with a mentor (an alum who has led an RA) who can help with logistics and suggest best practices.

KEY LEARNINGS

1) Questions to Consider for Reinvigorating an Existing RA

- Is there currently an alum listed as RA President?
- If yes, what is their interest level in handing over leadership to a new team or restarting activities? This can be delicate to assess.
- Are there any existing by-laws or operating procedures?

2) Leadership Structure

- Invite others to join you. It's good to have at least 2-3 people involved.
- Suggested positions for starting: President, VP, and Treasurer.
- If possible, include ASC, PPRR, and affinity group leaders.
- Consider bringing on a Recent Alumni leader.

3) Events

- How many events do you want to plan annually? There's no right answer. Some RAs hold one smashing event each year and some hold numerous events. Start small – such as with a kickoff event.
- Leverage existing University events/themes, e.g., Orange & Black Day or watch parties for Princeton athletics.
- Consider sending a survey to the region to get a sense of what Tigers in your region are looking for.

4) Finance

- Consider multiple payment options for events.
- When you decide you want to charge for attendance, you'll need to open a bank account. Have 2-3 signatories to ensure access.
- If you want to consider collecting dues, consult with your mentor and Alumni Engagement for best practices.
- International regions: Rules on collecting dues may depend on your country and local non-profit status.

5) Governance

- Creating a constitution and by-laws is not hard if you use templates in the Regional Officer's Handbook.
- Regional Associations can be officially recognized by Princeton and fall under their 501c3 umbrella.
- Consider writing "operating procedures" for your RA.
